This is WHAT WE HEARD...

Overall, you rated **PRIMARY CARE WORKFORCE SUPPORT** in our region with a score a score of **7 out of 10**.

What you thought worked well



- Your health professionals provide quality care including being responsive, listening well, and showing professionalism (64%).
- Convenient access to services including online booking as well as local availability (28%).
- Being able to get appointments when needed (20%).
- Long-term relationships with health professionals who know your health needs and current medications (12%).

What you thought could be done better



- Increasing the number of available health professionals in your community (24%).
- Ways to make healthcare more affordable, such as knowing more about free services and maintaining bulk billed appointments (24%).

How you said we can support a local workforce

- Health professionals said peer support, mentoring and career development opportunities would help attract them to work in a particular community (75%).
- Feeling included in a community, with good housing, support for your family, and connection to other health workers, would help them stay and continue working in a community (53%).
- Being able to help community members with their health, and feeling appreciated and respected, helps to feel connected to the community (21%).



The campaign consultation findings will be distributed to external key stakeholders and inform future Primary Health Network decision making, targeted service delivery of programs and provide important updated information for our region's Health Needs Assessment.
